Planning for the Future

NECC worked with Anne Gardon of Strategies for Change Now to update its strategic plan in 2023. A group of senior staff members and board members worked together to identify top priorities for the coming three years.

By creating several aspirational statements — NECC is a safe and welcoming space where all people belong; NECC is well known and recognized as a resource throughout its region; NECC's work is based on recognizing and addressing structural and systemic barriers, and reflects its values of inclusivity, transparency and respect — the team identified resources and a timeline to start to make this vision a reality.

The three priorities of the plan are to identify and plan a new building that is well-suited to NECC's programmatic needs and launching a capital campaign to fund it; to create a right-size infrastructure; and to promote inclusion and belonging throught the organization.

As you will read in the following pages, NECC programs found success in 2023 by following the vision of the new strategic plan. In all areas, we focused on stabilizing supports for the needs of our neighbors while working

to remove barriers from inclusion and access.

NECC's Food Pantry saw a historic increase in the number of families it served in 2023. The demand for the fresh and culturally appropriate food choices found in our pantry has never been higher. It has become clear that the food systems in place in Dutchess County are not meeting the need.

With the support of a grant from Glynwood Center for Food & Agriculture,

NECC has been able to host conversations with farmers, health care providers, community foundations, and others working to expand food access to begin to imagine what affordable, accessible, community-supported grocery access

looks like in a rural, under-resourced community. NECC also undertook a feasibility study with the USDA to gather data about food access needs in Dutchess County.

Looking ahead to 2024, NECC's Food Program will analyze the data collected and begin to work on new solutions. In the meantime, we continue to address our neighbors' urgent needs through a choice-based pantry that restores dignity to the process of accessing food.



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The goal, increasingly, is that we operate like a regional fresh food access hub. There is a lot of pressure to meet the immediate need, but we need to work at a systems level or nothing will change. We have generated a lot of momentum this year toward getting culturally relevant, fresh, healthy food to people in a way that feels good.

Through our Family Programs unit, our neighbors access a wide range of support services, from heating assistance to rental assistance to health care referrals to mental health support. We work with clients to stabilize their housing situation so that they can apply for jobs and provide for their families.

During 2023, we saw an increase in the need for housing support. Both renters and homeowners needed help to stay in their homes. And it was critical to keep people in their current homes because there are so few affordable housing options available.

It became clear that there were no systems in place to help owners of mobile homes stay in their homes when heating oil and other costs

Community Foundation, we were able to find an agency
and funding to start addressing that urgent need.
Looking forward, plans are in place to create an ongoing
fund for this work.

In addition, we started a new partnership with Hudson Valley Justice Center to educate renters on their rights. We hosted our first Housing Law Workshop in July. NECC clients have connected with HVJC for legal advice and have even been represented by their attorneys in

NECC offers childcare for children ages 18 months to 5 years old in the Early Learning Program and to elementary-aged children in the After School and Summer Enrichment programs. What makes NECC's Youth Programs stand out is our emphasis on social-emotional learning at all age levels.

In 2023, we introduced restorative practices to our Out-of-School Time programs (After School and Summer Enrichment). Restorative practices allow children to practice resolving conflict in a supportive community. Rather than have a person in authority dictate a punishment for undesired behavior, the group works together to figure out how to resolve conflict and move past it. This practice encourages communication and problem-solving skills that the children will bring forward into all areas of their lives as they mature.

This year the biggest need of our community was in summer programs. The Summer Enrichment program was fully enrolled

with 20 students, and at the ELP, both the toddler room and the pre-school room were full or nearly full all summer long.

The Transportation Program saw consistent use during 2023. The need for rides to medical appointments has remained consistent, but the distance traveled for each client has increased. As small clinics close and local hospitals trim services, our seniors are having to go farther and farther away to access medical care. NECC has been able to keep up with the demand, whether the client is using our services for a short time while they deal with an acute issue or whether NECC is their main method of transportation.

NECC has continued to work with the TriTown Coalition to address the lack of affordable housing in the area, which exacerbates many of the other struggles our neighbors face.

Young Adults in the School-to-Work Program NECC's three teen programs provide local teenagers with access to resources and experiences that otherwise would be unavailable to them in this rural, isolated community. NECC Teen Program Director Meredith Hamilton is part of the Northeast Dutchess Coalition for Youth Success, a group of 12 organizations working to promote quality of life and supporting youth in a collaborative way across the Millbrook, Dover, Webutuck, and Pine Plains school districts. Together, the coalition identifies trends affecting youth and

ways to make services more accessible.

Teen Team meets on Wednesdays for community service projects (a high school graduation requirement!) and on Fridays for fun, social activities. A trip to New York City on the train and regular trips to the mall allow our

youth, who often work part-time jobs and lack transportation, to both expand their horizons and have a typical teen experience.

Teen Jobs connects young people ages 14 and 15 with their first work experience, partnering with small, local businesses. In 2023, a record number of Teen Jobs participants were hired from their placement into a traditional part-time job. NECC works with the Dutchess County Workforce Investment Board to place teens in six-week summer internships.

The **School-to-Work** program works with older teens to help them find full-time employment that will lead to a sustainable career. S2W provides resume advice, interview practice, and connections with local employers.


Community Support

- Stop & Shop in Canaan, CT, named NECC the beneficiary of its November community bag program.




Fiscal Year 2023 Reporting
